

Pandemic Projects / Craig's Tool Display Boxes



<u>Tool Talk</u>

Drill bits seem to get cheaper and cheaper as sometimes they will not easily drill even one hole!

Let's look at how the drill bit is made. The less expensive ones (cheap) are sharpened like a pencil, so let's talk about good drill bits. Look at the end on the bit, and you will see a small flat surface, after that there is a drop off.

A drill bit is nothing more that a chisel that is turning in a circle. When it turns, it scrapes the metal off.

Now let's talk about why a drill bit fails. Turning too fast is one reason. Too much or too little pressure is another. And finally, oil is not for lubrication, but for cooling the bit.

With this in mind, how do we make even the cheapest drill bit last? Most electric drills turn the bit too fast, so try short bursts with reasonable pressure along with coolant. After drilling through a 1/4" steel plate, look at the other side. If you have a smooth exit hole, you did it right. If there is a large burr hanging down, you punched the hole instead of drilling it. Burs can be removed very easily by taking a larger bit, and touching the hole making a small chamfer. If you are drilling a deep hole you will need to make several plunges to clean out any extra material. Try it on a 2x4 first and you will see the need for it.

Drills usually fail on the outer edge first.

Sharpening a drill bit by hand is tricky. You will need a drill gauge to help get the center where it needs to be. If it is a little off you will drill off center making a bigger hole than wanted.

My 5th Car

A 1932 Durant was my 5th car, and is related to my 1st, 3rd, and 4th cars. William (Billy) Crapo Durant organized General Motors in 1908, but lost control for the second time in the crash of 1921. By 1922, he had put together Durant Motors and made both the Durant and Star Automobiles. I owned the Durant and 3 Stars at the same time which should have made me a "big time" collector compared to Bill Harrah in Reno, Nevada, who only had 3 Durant Motors cars at once. The B+W picture shows the Durant shortly after I acquired it in Iowa.

The car was in Great condition including the paint! Over 14 years that I had it, I replated the chrome, detailed the engine, replaced the wood running boards, painted the wheels, and put new tires on. The 6 cylinder Continental ran fine, but the upholstery was poor, so I just covered it with old army blankets!

My Durant was my main transportation for 3 years while I attended the University of Iowa. I had a 100cc Yamaha motorcycle to get to classes , and built a bolt on bumper rack for the Durant to carry it. I still have the motorcycle today.

The Durant would cruise at 65 mph on Interstate 80 during various weekend round trips to my parents house 120 miles each way. My car had no heater, so I found one at a junkyard for \$10.00, and hung it under the dash with wire. Hoses were hooked directly to the rubber radiator hoses with a valve to allow Summer shut-off. The amount of heat was dependent on the outside temperature and how much cardboard I stuck in front of the radiator. Snow storms were no problem as I now had heat and tall skinny tires plowing through the drifts.

My younger female cousin needed a ride from school for Thanksgiving. She had never ridden in the Durant or any of my old cars. We were about halfway home on I-80, and the wind was blowing so strong that it popped the roof fabric off at the front and ripped it halfway back. I think it started raining thru the chicken wire that she started crying. Now, I'm not worried about the wind and rain at 65mph, I'm worried about finding the materials to repair the roof for the return trip on Friday!

On another one of those trips, I broke an axle. Fortunately I had my motorcycle on the back bumper so I could continue on to school. I had the axle welded as I was unable to find a replacement. I continued to try and locate another axle for many years, but was unable. Some years later the axle came back to bite me on a trip to Hawaii.

After graduation, I attempted to drive my first car (1926 Star) from Iowa to California for shipment to my first job in Hawaii. Some place in the desert, west of Salt Lake City, the fan in the Star seized up, and went through the radiator. I hitched a ride back to the city and rented a U-Haul truck. Near where the car had broken I found an old open trailer which I used to load the car onto the truck. Even with the car on the truck, I stopped to see the famous Harrah car collection in Reno.

Three years later, I returned to Iowa to sell my 3rd car, (Star) after which I was going to drive the Durant to California. Imagine 3 years later driving the same route remembering what happened the last time I tried this! I could hear every noise, waiting to signal another breakdown as I drove through the desert. I made it to Wendover (near the Bonneville speedway) where I spent the night, and changed the oil. Next day the car was running great until about 70 miles before Reno. The axle broke again. Lucky for me that a highway worker stopped by. He came back after work, and towed me to the next town of Fernley where I checked into a motel that had those rounded aluminum trailers for rent as rooms I quickly pulled out the axle and the guy took me to a welder who worked out of an old Quonset hut in the desert. I installed the repaired axle that night, and was ready to go in the morning. After stopping again at the Harrah collection, the Durant made the shipping docks in Oakland California, although the wheel had a 1/2 wobble. After about 4 years in Hawaii, I was able to locate a NOS axle on the mainland.

The color picture shows the Durant in Hawaii along with my 1926 Star, (my two boys are sitting on the running board) and my 1972 VW bus. But that is another story.

AACA Spring Nationals at Charlotte N. Carolina

The AACA Spring Nation show was held in Charlotte, N. Carolina April 9th-11th 2021. The show was well attended with 230 cars of all classes. The weather was predicted to be heavy rain on show day, but all the cars turned out, and it only rained twice. Once before the show started and then as they were leaving.

The club in Charlotte was very friendly and extremely helpful. Registration went smoothly and I heard very few complaints.

I had registered for the Judges School to become an AACA judge. The class was informative and enjoyable. It was a bit less that two hours. I did learn a lot about how the judging is run, and what to look for.

When the class was done, we "Apprentice" judges were put in a team to practice evaluate two cars. The AACA judging teachers worked with us and showed us things to look for and how to gauge the number of point deductions, if any. At the end of this, we were given our judging chips, a CJE chip and a judging school chip.

Jack was out during this time judging on the field. He told me later about a few nice rare cars he saw. Example, a Sears Company car, and an ElCamino that was rare. It had a factory 396 with a four speed. When all the judging was done, and awards made, Jack and I sat out of the rain in his truck taking some pictures of the show cars leaving. There were some beauties. It started raining pretty hard so we left.

Overall, this was a great experience, and a chance to become a judge was not to be missed. I look forward to my first real judging assignment.
